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A Scottish prayer

BAPTISTS have been encouraged to join a call to prayer for Scotland and its referendum on independence.

The leaders of all the main denominations in Scotland have issued a joint statement asking Christians to pray both about the vote on 18 September, and the kind of Scotland they wish it to become - whatever the result.

The statement, signed by Alan Donaldson, General Director of the Baptist Union of Scotland, refers to the actions the country's spiritual leaders 300 years ago when Scotland and England came together as one nation.

Just as then, today's leaders do not want to take sides, but give spiritual leadership.

'In the year leading up to the Union there was a call to pray and fast for the Queen (Queen Anne) and the two Governments (in Edinburgh and London) as they conducted negotiations on the details, with the following statement in mind, "That all may be done to the glory of God...."'

'300 years ago the church gave spiritual leadership, without taking sides. Today, there is the same, if not a greater need for the church in Scotland to give such leadership once again.

'While the 'Yes' and 'No'



campaigns focus on the political, economic, social, educational and cultural issues, which are of course essential to the debate, as Christians we also care about Scotland's moral and spiritual climate. We believe that God is the ultimate authority and we have a biblical responsibility to pray for our nation and its leaders at this crucial time.

'Therefore, as Christian leaders we are asking the church in Scotland to join in praying about the Referendum and Scotland's future.

'What kind of nation do we wish Scotland to be?

'History shows us over and over again that prayer changes things and that God responds to the prayers of His people.'

The statement was shared by the European Baptist Federation, whose General Secretary Tony Peck was raised in Scotland.

Mr Peck encouraged Baptists across Europe to join in prayer, particularly as the debate intensifies in the days leading up to the referendum vote on 18 September.

He said, 'As the political campaign nears its end there are signs that the debate has become more bitter between the 'Yes' and 'No' camps, and of course the result could profoundly affect the whole of the United Kingdom.

'I would ask our European Baptist family to join this Call to Prayer, that whatever the result, there might afterwards be a coming together of the Scottish people as one and a healing of divisions.

'The Baptist Union of Scotland has always played a very active role in the EBF and we especially pray for our Baptist church members and leaders as they participate in this vote.'

Bring back our girls

MEMBERS of Girls' Brigade England & Wales are joining a campaign to pray and advocate for the kidnapped Nigerian school girls on the 150th day of their disappearance

On 14 April, 230 girls were kidnapped from the Chibok Government Secondary School by the terrorist group Boko Haram in Nigeria. All are still missing, and this Thursday (11 September) marks 150 days since the girls were taken.

Encouraging its members worldwide to 'raise a voice for the voiceless', Girls' Brigade International (GB) has produced a prayer resource, with help from Open Doors, for use on Thursday.

To generate a significant social media presence it also organised a Thunderclap for Thursday - Thunderclap is a website that allows people to pledge a social media post. All pledged posts went out at 1pm, pointing to the Open Doors website where users could post a message to the girls' families.

England & Wales's advocacy group will also be writing a letter to Prime Minister David Cameron to remind him about the missing girls, and urging him to use his influence in the international community to ensure everything is done to get them home.

Claire Rush, Participation & Advocacy Co-ordinator for GB England & Wales, said, 'Thursday 11 September marks 150 days since more than 200 Chibok young women,

some members of GB, were kidnapped by Boko Haram.

'These young women have been silent for 150 days but we have a voice that can be heard. Let's raise our voice for the voiceless on 11 September.'

Charity Viz-a-Viz to close

VIZ-A-VIZ Ministries (VAVM) UK, founded by Baptist minister Dennis Pethers in 1993, is to close.

In a statement the charity's trustees said the decision has been taken after 'much prayer and discussion' and will 'release its various ministries to flourish in new ways'.

Viz-A-Viz is an evangelistic organisation with several ministries under its umbrella, including The Rooftop, Check it Out, ARISE Ministries and

SOLID. The statement said that over the past two years it has been 'increasingly evident that God has been moving us into a new phase of ministry', as each of the individual ministries have developed.

'It has always been the intention of VAVM to help ministries to flourish,' the statement continued, 'and as this is no longer the case then VAVM has served its purpose.'

The statement also mentioned financial challenges, and is

requesting donations to help staff who have had reduced salaries in recent months. The statement added that three members of staff will leave at the end of September.

It also paid tribute to the impact of the charity over the years.

'We have a deep sense that so much of what was hoped for at the beginning has been fulfilled over 21 years.'

Church helps feed local children

A BAPTIST church in Middlesbrough provided free lunches for children in need of extra support over the summer holidays.

South Bank Baptist Church offered its premises three times a week for a pilot project that saw more than 200 free packed lunches given to local primary school pupils throughout the summer.

The Lunch Box Project came about via the Redcar Area Foodbank, for which the church is a distribution point, and in conjunction with South Bank Primary School.

The school referred the pupils who had received free school lunches in the previous academic year and were thought to need extra support through the holidays.

The church was asked to open up its premises and provide volunteers each Monday, Wednesday and Friday, which it was only too happy to do.

When the children arrived they picked up a brand new lunchbox, and were able to stay and take part in crafts, games and face paintings. When they were ready to leave they could take away a sandwich, bag of crisps, cereal



bar, and fruit drink. Parents were invited to stay, and the lunchbox could then be filled on their next visit.

Each session saw between 11 and 21 children pop by, and in total 208 lunches were distributed.

'We felt like we were offering a little bit of help,' said minister Jon Edwards.

'While it was a lot of fun and had a great impact on us, there's part of me that thinks it's dreadful that something like this is needed, where families like this are consistently struggling to feed themselves and their children. It's a shame there is such an issue; there's a real issue

locally and nationally.

'Something needs to be done. This is just a small project, a simple project, and it's the first time we've done it.'

However, he was impressed with how his church responded.

'The whole church took hold of it - it wasn't something that three or four of us were driving. They wanted to get involved and support and pray for it, and I actually had to turn volunteers away.'

'We would struggle to run a more traditional week-long holiday club, but this provides a more regular means of supporting local families over the school holidays.'
